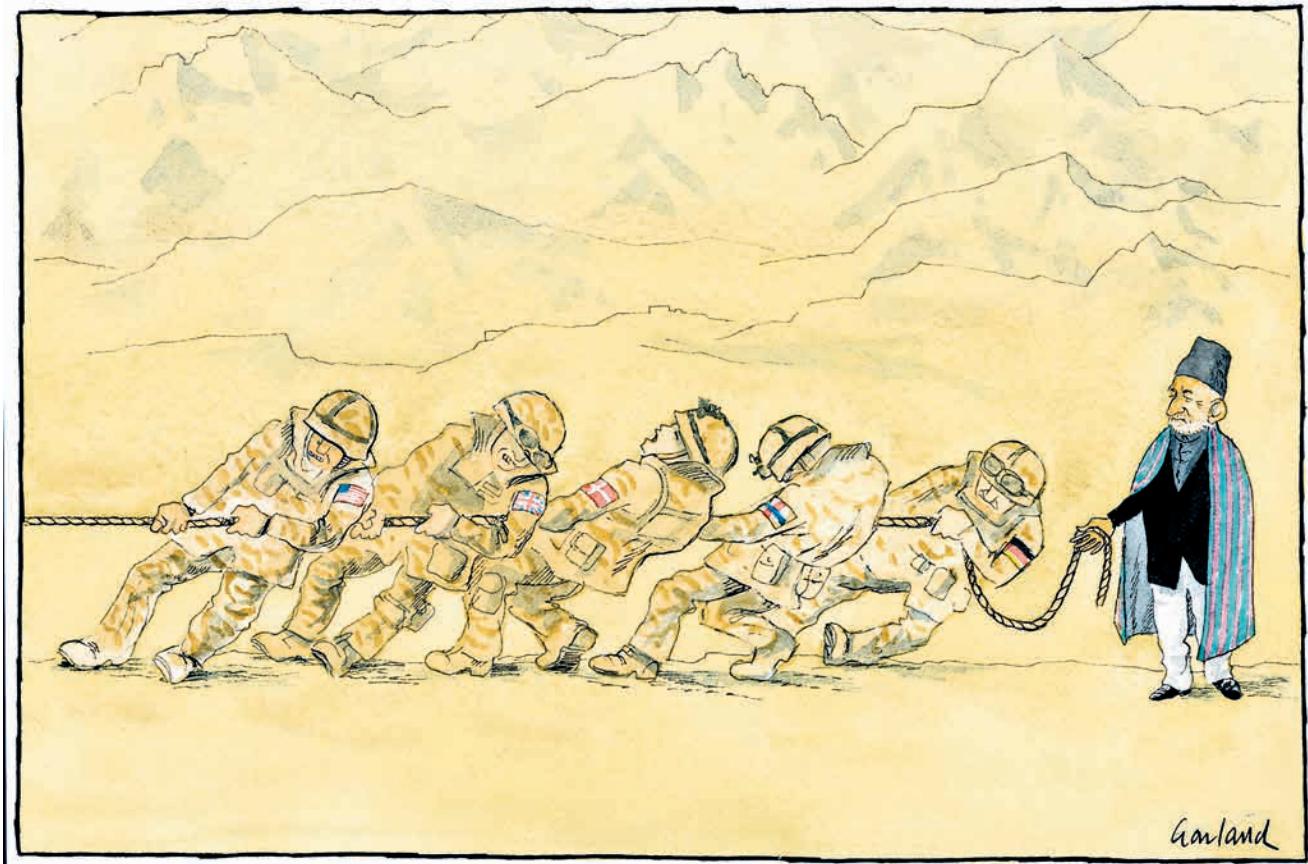

**Source A**

A cartoon from a British newspaper published in 2009. The soldiers represent the international coalition. Hamid Karzai, the Afghan President, is shown holding the end of the rope.



**Source B**

An Australian newspaper cartoon published in August 1990 showing Hitler on Saddam Hussein's shoulder. Australia belonged to the international coalition fighting Iraq in the 1990–1991 Gulf War. Hitler invaded neighbouring countries in the 1930s.

**Source C**

Adapted from a speech made by Saddam Hussein to the Iraqi people on 6 January 1991.
