Noise has become so much a part of our culture that we cannot escape it. It is impossible to avoid music in the supermarket or a voice in the elevator. Announcements of all kinds are made when we travel: in bus stations, airports or even in our own cars. Although we often hear information which may be useful to us, like departure and arrival times, we also have to listen to advice about not leaving our belongings behind or reporting something suspicious. The result is that we pay attention to what we want to hear, but ignore what we have heard many times before or do not think applies to us. But this constant assault on our ears has other consequences, too. We are so used to background sound that we are afraid of silence. Wearing headphones has become a way of life and therefore we are losing the ability to communicate with other people except by email or social media. Consequently, we lose the capacity to really listen to what people are saying to us. The world of technology, designed to facilitate communication, has actually made it more difficult.

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
