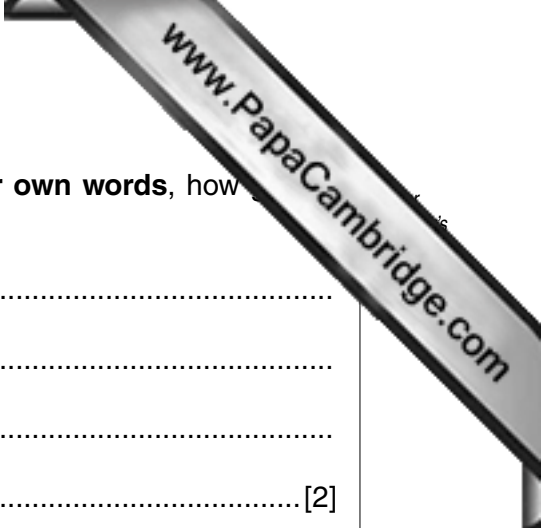

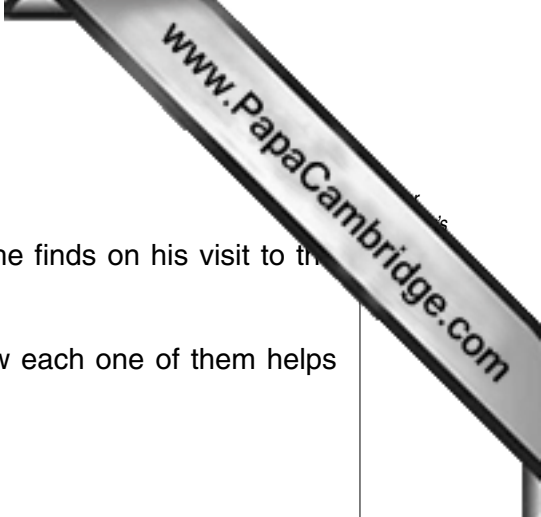

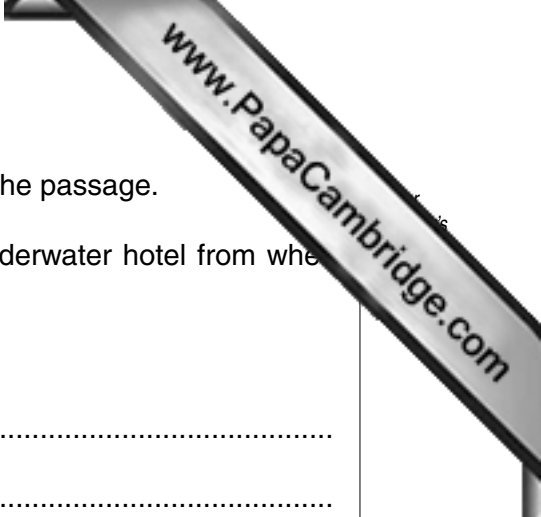

**Up to 10 marks are available for the content of your answer, and up to 10 marks for the quality of your writing.**

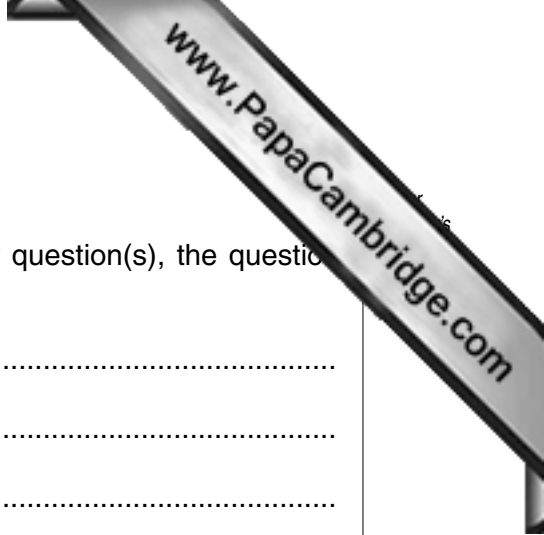
